The life of a stray is no life for a senior dog, and Titan got lucky when a good Samaritan brought him to our shelter. It was immediately clear that Titan was suffering from a great deal of pain, and something was wrong with his face.


At our shelter, medical staff worked quickly to clean Titan's infected ears and determine the source of his immense pain. The other pressing matter was the difference in Titan's face from left side to right side. After running diagnostic tests, our shelter veterinarian determined Titan had permanent paralysis on the left side of his face, though the cause was unclear.

Soon, Titan underwent x-rays in hopes of finding the root of his discomfort. The radiographs showed Titan was suffering from pretty severe arthritis in his spine and hips. Finally able to receive relief from his pain, Titan's joyful personality began to shine! In no time at all, Titan won over his forever family and is now enjoying life in a loving home!



Happy Endings Fit for Presidents

In November, Akron Municipal Court awarded ownership of more than 50 animals rescued from a condemned home to the Humane Society of Summit County. These animals, named after presidents, were living in horrendous conditions with little access to food and water, and many were suffering from intense illnesses when they arrived at HSSC. Given expert medical care and the time to learn to trust people, nearly all the cats and dogs have now found loving forever homes.

Adams, now known as Louie, has jumped right into his new life. "We have been blessed with the sweetest, cuddliest little lovebug! I marvel at how loving this dear little boy is, especially coming from that background! He sleeps with me every night and has just been a joy!!"
