Each year, the Humane Society of Summit County rescues nearly 1,000 kittens and over 150 puppies from terrible situations of illness, injury, abuse, neglect, and abandonment. These small, fragile animals require special care and attention outside of the shelter environment to recover, survive, and ultimately find their forever families.



Rori, a Shepherd mix puppy, entered our foster care program when she was just a couple weeks old after she was found to be suffering from a dangerously infected wound on her shoulder. A dedicated family welcomed Rori into their home and provided her with scheduled formula feeding, antibiotics, baths, socialization, and endless love. Focused and delicate care such as this can be difficult to provide in a shelter setting, making foster homes like Rori's essential to the success of our mission!

Within a few weeks, Rori was big, strong, and healthy and returned to our shelter to find her new family. Her sweet and silly personality caught the attention of a visiting family, and, within mere hours of returning to the shelter, Rori had found her forever family!

Stories such as Rori's are special, but not necessarily unique! All year long, but especially during the summer, young animals are rescued and given a second chance at love and happiness through our Foster Care Program, which continues to expand and impact more and more animals in need.

Last year, the Humane Society of Summit County was awarded a transformational grant from The Cynthia Parker Matthews Family Foundation in support of our Foster Care Program. This financial support provided the means to create a staff Foster Coordinator position, in turn allowing us to better serve our animals and assist our foster families. Over 80 families currently volunteer their time, hearts, and homes to help our rescued animals and are truly the core of our Foster Care Program. A direct transfer of stock may give you an immediate deduction and save capital gains tax if the shares have appreciated—all while providing the greatest possible benefit for the animals at HSSC!
